Getting ready for school

If your child is starting school after the summer, you may be approaching this major milestone with conflicting emotions; excited for the new adventures they'll have and new friends to be made, and sad that there are venturing into the big world without you.

Your child is also bound to be experiencing a variety of emotions about this transition, feeling proud to be a "Big Kid" and worried about starting something unfamiliar.

In the weeks before starting try to keep your efforts low-key. If you make too big a deal out of this milestone, your child may end up being more worried than excited. Here are some fun ideas to keep the focus on fun.

Use pretend play to explore the idea of (the big) school. Take turns being

the parent, child and teacher.

Act out common daily routines such as saying goodbye, singing, swimming, circle time. lunch time.

Reassure your child that his/her new school is a good place where he/she will have fun and learn. Answer his/her questions patiently.

Read books about going to school. Choose several books together with your child over the summer before school starts. Ask how your child is feeling.

Visit your child's new school together as this will increase your child's comfort with and confidence in this new setting.

Returning to school/child care after a long break can create similar emotions and anxieties. Preparing and reassuring your child before they start the school year will ease this transition.
